Descriptif	African people have interacted with their Asian and Latin American counterparts for centuries. However, these interactions importantly intensified over the past three decades, repositioning the African continent (and the sub-Sharan region in particular) within the wider geography of international relations, economic circulations and cultural globalization. If the most visible manifestation of this phenomenon is the expansion of Chinese political and economic interests in the continent, a larger and more complex web of human, material and cultural interactions characterizes the contemporary landscape of Africa's south-south relations. By adopting an interdisciplinary approach (African studies, history, political sciences, anthropology), this course explores globalization from the vantage point of the Global South, taking Africa in particular as an entry point. It looks at the history and contemporary configurations of the relations between African, Asian and Latin American countries through a holistic approach that keeps the political and economic dimensions of these phenomena connected to their wider social and cultural contexts, the analysis of macro-phenomena tied to individual experiences. To do so, the course is divided into six teaching modules: (1) History; (2) Politics and international relations; (3) Goods and infrastructures; (4) People; (5) Religions; (6) Media and popular culture.  Each module combines the discussion of larger, transversal trends with the analysis of specific case studies that, through their specificities, can help students understand global phenomena in their locally grounded dimensions. The course will thus offer an alternative understanding of globalization process that permit to reconceptualize the European experience within a larger universe of ex-centric and multipolar interconnections that characterize contemporary politics and culture.
